Reading is a lifetime habit. It gives your brain a different kind of workout which no TV channel or mobile phone app can possibly give you. It can slash stress levels, encourage positive thinking and strengthen friendships. Reading boosts your vocabulary. Researchers estimate that we learn 5 to 15 percent of all the words we know through reading. This is very important for you children, as your vocabulary size is directly related to the books you read. Most importantly, reading makes you aware of the world around you. Books can transport you to the corners of the Earth where probably you have never ever visited. It enhances your imagination and creativity. And of course, books help you brighten your day!

A parent writes

OF TOMORR Disorderliness and unruliness are observed everywhere in our society today. People gossip on the road, park their vehicles according to their whims and fancies, show physical might, scramble and meddle in shops and markets, oblivious to inconveniences of law abiding citizens of the society. Some irritated people comment that this behavior is the result of lack of proper teaching in educational institutions or because of inappropriate nurturing in the families. Now a question arises, whether the teachers are responsible or the parents are accountable for these

People often say, "He is an educated man, but his behavior is not up to the mark". In common concept, if a man attains a certain qualification he is considered as educated. But if that man displays some indecent behavior, will it be justified to adorn

unruly activities.

him as an educated person? On the other hand, we might find an illiterate man living in a remote village adorned with generosity and hospitality. Then will it be reasonable to rationalize those people in the villages as uneducated?

To my understanding the word 'Education' has a wide significance. Attaining a certificate of gualification from educational institutions is not sufficient enough to affirm one to be an educated person. It needs more. If a person possesses a good culture in addition to his academic gualification, he will be embellished to be a perfect person. Educational institutions help us to acquire academic knowledge. If a person obtains some academic degree, he is simply a certificate or degree holder, not educated in the strictest sense of the term, unless he is cultured.

Culture of a person germinates

from his own family and the environment in which he belongs. In this context I recall a very short story carrying a large connotation that I came across during my school days. The story goes like this

There was an old man with a disability of movement. His body trembled and whatever he took into his grip often tumbled down the ground and sometimes broke into pieces. Thus, he was served solid food in wooden dishes on a wooden tumbler by his son and daughter-inlaw. One day the couple noticed that their four-year old son was busy cutting wood. Seeing this, the couple gueried their son about his work. The four-year old boy replied that he was trying to manufacture two wooden dishes and twotumblers out of wood. The couple again asked the boy about the utility ofthose articles. The boy placidly answered that he would provide food and drink in those articles, when his parents would

NausaranAdil replied, "From wicked and evil persons." The man: "How?"

NausaranAdil: 'The deeds and activities which they do, I always stay away from those."

Thus, even if there is no environment and atmosphere for erudition of good culture either in the family or in educational institutions, a child may learn it as NausaranAdil did. To acquire this learning a minute of surveillance is necessary to see whether a particular act of a person really attracts us as satisfactory and acceptable and if our conscience immediately negates it, better we should avoid such type of activity. This way *we* may be able to improve our nature, temperament and personality.

It is possible to keep away from improper and intolerable activities if, consistently, we create self determination and perseverance to guide our consciences intelligently and it is absolutely possible to create our determination and willpower. We must follow the words of famous poet William Ernest Henley, "I am the master of my fate; I am the captain of my soul."

The present generation of the children, since they are the future of tomorrow, must be aware and conscious to preserve the society in its proper state in order to develop our nation in all aspects.
